RMALITE OR BALLOT -THE CHOICE

He recalled that in December 1983 at Grand Lodge he asked, "What happens when the Sinn Fein replaces S.D.L.P.? Will Jim Prior refuse to accept the ballot box as it suits him?". His successor Douglas Hurd is faced with that problem.

THE REAL NETTLE

Behind it however the real nettle had to be grasped. The legacy of Merlin Rees had to be rejected. "He politicised P.I.R.A. This legacy must be refused for the good of democracy. If fascists were banned in England and English footballers are banned in Europe then Sinn Fein as long as it grows on violence cannot be given credibility by the abuse of the ballot box.'

Bro. Smyth declared that a free nation dare not allow freedom to be used as a chain to enslave it. Forty years after the defeat of Nazism had we forgotten how democracy was used to destroy freedom?

In this context the logic of the Presbyterian minister, lauded though it was by the BBC "Sunday Sequence," must be examined. "To refuse to recognise Sinn Fein as a political party until they forego the armalite is not to deny the verdict of the ballot. If that reasoning is correct and some apparently think it is - will they then support

Unionist parties if they take up the armalite also?"

To engage in generalized condemnation of violence was not enough. It only played into the hands of those who speak of the violence of institutions. Has the State not God-given

authority to protect its citizens and their property from anarchists and others?

"From this Grand Lodge I speak plainly," said the Grand Master. "We take a fundamentally different position theologically from Roman Catholicism. We also differ politically from those who esponse Irish Nationalism. Nevertheless it is our hope and desire to live at peace with our neighbours whatever their basic theology on politics. We hope they in turn will manifest a similar hope and work with us for peace and reconstruction in our community. A first step would be to stop murdering our friends under any pretext and stop excusing bloody deeds as accidents of war.

"IMPLACABLE HATRED"

"If they do not and they continue to find support from over 30% of the Roman Catholic people then we have no choice but to recognise their implacable hatred and assure them that their efforts will not succeed in defeating us. Rather they will only stimulate a great resolve to resist them. The watch cry is still 'No Surrender.

In his introductory remarks Bro. Smyth said they met in the historic city of Londonderry "at a time fraught with problems and pressures similar to those forced by our forefathers who maintained and developed this city."

Bessbrook Hall

Bessbrook District LOL's £60,000 scheme in restoring the 100-year-old Bessbrook Town Hall is progressing well and brethren in the South Armagh village are hopeful the work will be completed by next Spring.

The work carried out with the support and approval of the Architectural Heritage Society involves the erection of a complete new roof for the spacious building and complete interior refurbishing.

With the contractors due to finish on the roof within a few weeks attention will focus on the inside of the magnificent Mourne granite building, where extensive plumbing, masonry, decorating and electrical work has to be carried out.

The Hall, known to many as The Institute, was purchased by Bessbrook District LOL No. 11 from Bessbrook Spinning Company in 1968. It was erected by the Richardson family, who brought the textile industry to Bessbrook in the mid-19th century and has served as a community centre for people in the village.

The Bessbrook Orangemen have sought to maintain the character of the Hall and their ambitious restoration programme should be fulfilled within the next year.

Help in financing the work has come from their brethren in other parts of Northern Ireland and to date almost £7,000 has been received in generous donations from approximately 450 lodges throughout the Province. This generosity has been sincerely appreciated by the Bessbrook lodges.

A considerable amount of money has also been raised by the brethren and loyalists in the Bessbrook area through direct donations and fund-raising events and with grants available more than half of the

s projected costs have now been

The building has a large assembly hall with accommodation for 700 and the adjoining rooms over two storeys provide the space for recreation and leisurely persuits.

The centenary year of Bessbrook Town Hall commences on October 5 next and it is planned to have a celebratory re-opening event next summer

Bessbrook, the smallest of the 11 Orange districts in Co. Armagh, has four lodges with a combined membership of around 180. Affiliated organisations are a Black Preceptory with 80 members, a Junior Orange lodge with 25 members, an Apprentice Boys branch, and three bands—the championship-playing Bessbrook Crimson Arrow Pipe Band, Bessbrook True Blues Flute, and Divernagh Accordion Band.

The District lodge administers its Orange Halls at Bessbrook and Divernagh, the Town Hall, and the former Masonic Hall, which is presently being converted into two dwelling houses with the help of a Housing Executive grant.

A 20-member Management Committee meets fortnightly to control the affairs of the Bessbrook property and work men will shortly be recruited to carry out internal refurbishing work in the Town Hall under the Government's A.C.E. scheme.

Group Plans to Undermine No. 1 Place in UK

In a strongly worded statement, the South Belfast Ulster Unionist M.P., Rev. Martin Smyth, has hit out at the use of British taxpayers money by an Anglo-Irish group to undermine Northern Ireland's status as part of the United Kingdom.

The "Anglo-Irish Encounter Group" was set up in 1982 by the British and Irish governments with the purpose of "promoting greater understanding" between Britain and Ireland.

UNITED IRELAND THINK TANK

But Mr. Smyth says that the group is acting as a think-tank and a front group for those who wish to see a United Ireland.

"Encounter was given £17,000 of taxpayers money in 1983/84, and £20,000 in 1984/85, and this year it has £24,000 to spend. These sums came from the Foreign Office Account, and have clearly been used to destroy Northern Ireland as part of the UK," he said.

"Encounter held three conferences in London and Dublin in 1984 and 1985 at which academics and others discussed ways of fudging the essential issues at stake in the debate about Ulster's right to be British.

"It is unfortunate that it took £61,000 worth of British taxpayers money to find out what they could have discovered after five minutes in Ulster—that we will not be duped, bullied or cajoled into a United Ireland."

Mr. Smyth went on to say that part of the aims of Encounter was to brainwash British schoolchildren and university students into the idea that "Northern Ireland does not exist."

He cited as justification for this the fact that a daughter of Irish Prime Minsiter Garrett Fitzgerald who lectures at a British University, and who is also involved in Encounter, is promoting the idea of "Irish studies" being taught as A level and University subjects.

CREEPING CENSORSHIP

"What we have here is a process of creeping censorship
— a united Ireland is the only way — and the fact that one
million Unionists and a third of Roman Catholics oppose
this can be overlooked."

Moderator And His Protestantism

An Orangeman, past Grand Master of the City of Londonderry Grand Lodge, the Right Wor. Bro. the Rev. Dr. Robert Dickinson, was installed as Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, at its most impressive Opening Meeting on Monday, 3 June, in the Assembly Hall, Belfast. The week before he had conferred on him the Doctor of Divinity degree of the Church's Union Theological College.

Dr. Dickinson declared himself unhesitatingly an apologist for New Testament, and Reformation, Biblical theology. His Moderatorial address was a precise and pungent reiteration of his evangelicalism.

Because of the strong Protestant stand he took part in some radio and televison interviews in which the interviewers probed his attitudes to Church Unity generally and Roman Catholicism particularly, he came out of the encounters leaving no-one in any doubt as to where he stands on the subjects. He is a realist who

recognises that the church situation here pleads for neighbourliness, but denies the need for any more than that now. Beliefs and principles are not to be denied in the present state of religion in the country.

His answers to questions about the compatibility of Moderatorship and membership of the Orange Institution were an explanation of the place and purpose of the Order and a defence of it. He found no incompatibility. On the contrary he saw the Institution as an extension of his ministry.

We wish our brother well in his year of office. He is well prepared mentally and physically for whatever the future holds for him. We may be sure that he will stand firm for the faith once for all delivered unto the saints. Of one other thing we can be certain, the Moderator is going to have a most eventful year at home and abroad in the highest office in his church. The Lessons of Sportsmanship

Politically and economically the Province is not in good shape, but in sport it has reached unexpected heights. It is amazing that a small geographical area like ours can make a sizable impact on many sporting activities. That it does so at such a time as this is the more surprising.

The fact that irrespective of religious denomination and political affiliation we are at one in our pride and pleasure at the achievements of our sporting heroes is the evidence that the people of this divided country are not divided in everything. The great win of Barry McGuigan, which made him the Featherweight Champion of the World, brought joy to us all. His performance against one of the greatest ever world champions Eusebio Padrosa, caused experienced boxing commentators to describe it as the best fight they had ever seen.

An endaring young man he is everyone's favourite. He has a sensitivity to the feelings of others and a thoughtful approach to life which is not always to be found among sportsmen who are the idols

of the crowds. His win and that of Denis Taylor, in the World Snooker Championship, will be remembered for a very long time. And there is Norman Whiteside, the twenty year old, already an established professional footballer, who scored the vital goal for Manchester United in the F.A. Cup Final. Talented and competitive Norman has enhanced the reputation of a little place which has produced such soccer giants as George Best and Pat Jennings. With Joey Dunlop, motor-cycle ace these men display those easily recognisable Ulster qualities of commonsense, friendliness, humour and humility. The performances of our International soccer team have been more than creditable when it is appreciated that the manager has never more than a pool of about fifteen players from which to draw.

The International Rugby Union team's winning of the Triple Crown this year was most pleasing to us, for Ulstermen were well represented in the side.

Whilst some sports are divisive in the Province it is only fair to say that most others have the other and better effect.

Sinn Fein in Council

The debate continues on the attitudes to Sinn Fein as they attend in Council to represent those who elected them to office. The local government situation promises to be rowdy as the Unionists campaign against the Sinn Feiners and the SDLP accommodates to them.

Opinions are being voiced by people without party affiliation that while the position of Sinn Fein is incredible—the use of the armalite and the ballot box together, when peaceful politics and terrorism can never be compatible—it should be heard when it is the voice of the ten per cent who voted for its candidates to give them political status. Better, it is argued, to have Sinn Fein politically involved and facing the challenge to put its policies to the electorate.

That viewpoint was clearly expressed in a debate in the General Assembly by a Belfast minister when it was suggested that Sinn Fein, willing to serve in Council, might influence the Provos to abandon the weaponry of terror.

The contention repeated subsequently in radio and television interviews had little sympathy from the very many people. Protestants and Roman Catholics, who are shocked that those who believe that political change can come through the gun and the bomb can also be "legislators" in a society which has suffered so much at their hands.

Bro. Harold McCusker, M.P., described the attempt to include Sinn Fein in democratic proceedures as genteel drawing room nonsense. He argued that there must be no association with murderers by politicians who have real regard for the democratic process.

The attempts of Sinn Feiners, like Adams and Morrison, to justify the killing of Ulster men and women are assaults on the minds of decent citizens. The refusal to accept the reality that the Provos will not win the war they wage against society is the reason why it continues. It will stop when the IRA is defeated, as it must be, by the security forces in both states of Ireland and rejected by those who support them now.

It will not be beaten while present security policies, clearly inadequate, are pursued. It has been apparent since the present "Troubles" began that there is something less than total commitment to the eradication of terrorism in the Province. It is hard to believe that the terrorists could stand against the might of the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland if there was a top level determination to remove them from the scene.

The general result is that there were at the last census 693,357 members of the Established Church in Ireland - men, women and children - and 596,820 Protestant Dissenters; and that the gross income of the bishoprics, dignitaries and livings of the Established Church in Ireland amounts to 586,428 1. and the net income to 448,942 1.

An Ulster — American Link

Ulster has connections with many of the nations of the world and especially the United States of America.

The words of the U.S. national anthem "The Star-Spangled Banner" were written by an American lawyer, Francis Scott Key, in 1814. The tune, however, was not an American composition but was borrowed from Britain. The exact origin of the tune is not absolutely certain but it is commonly thought to have been composed by an Englishman called John Smith for the Anacreontic Society in London. It is, however, certain that the tune had an Ulster connection.

It is found in a little 18th century book of melodies without words, and it is entitled "Royal Inniskillings." The book was inscribed inside with the name of William Brown of the 6th or Inniskilling Dragoons, lying at Romford. The details of the inscription fix the date at 1797. This proves that the tune was associated with a famous Ulster regiment before it was associated with the U.S. national anthem.

It is, therefore, possible that the tune was originally written by Smith and then adopted as an Ulster martial tune or alternatively that it was originally an Ulster tune which was subsequently adapted by Smith. Further research may yet settle the matter but Ulster can certainly claim a link with the American anthem.

SDLP Alliance With Sinn Fein

One of the astounding side nects of the success of Sinn Fein in the recent elections for he 26 local authorities in Northern Ireland has been the mmediate line-up with them of

the SDLP people who also got elected. In one Council after another where this was found necessary to counter Unionist objections to sitting at the same table with Sinn Feiners the

Sinn Fein members were not alone in their attitude to Unionist solidarity. The SDLP who state vehemently that they totally oppose the Provisional IRA and those who associate with them in acts of terrorism are not slow to signify that when the chips are down they are as united as can be. This was clearly evident in Craigavon Borough

Council as reports in the media indicate. The Unionists — Official and DUP — moved their chairs away from the table in protest at the presence of the two Sinn Fein men who were electred to the Council — at the loss of an SDLP seat and the overthrow of senior SDLP Alderman Paddy Crilly who had the honour of serving as Deputy Mayorintheoutgoing Council.

But when the crunch came at the first meeting to elect a Mayor the SDLP, evidently oblivious to the injury the Sinn Fein campaign had done to Mr. Crilly and the loss of a seat,

took their place in support of the Sinn Fein men who were ejected by the RUC when they refused to go out after the Council had declared them, as it were, persona non grata.

History is Repeated

The pattern emanating from Craigavon was repeated elsewhere in a number of other Councils where the SDLP and the Workers Party sprang to the defence of the Sinn Feiners. They emphasised that they abhorred the terrorism of the Provisional IRA, whose mouthpiece the Sinn Fein organisation unashamedly is, but the abhorrence ended there and with a show of abject hypocrisy the SDLP and the Workers Party filed in as friends of the Sinn Feiners and used the occasion here and there to lambast the Official Unionists and the DUP for their action in raising constitutional arguments.

The SDLP have little to commend themselves, for have they not abstained from serving their country and their constituents in the Assembly at Stormont? Their record is no

They are more interested in traipsing through Newry, Dundalk and Drogheda en route to Dublin where they hope to convince the world of the "wrongs" their constituents are suffering in this corner of Ireland. Even in Dublin the tale of woe is said to be wearing rather thin.

Strip Searches - The Facts

One of the complaints which has been put forward with persistence by the anti-Unionist, anti-British elements in Ulster concerns the question of the strip searching of women in Northern Ireland's womens prison at Armagh. For some years

people such as Father Faul of Dungannon and his comradein-arms. Father Raymond Murray of Armagh, have been very vocal in protesting about the "indignity" of women having to undergo strip searching procedures while these ladies are guests of Her Majesty the Queen. This campaign, enunciated by priests and politicians, has been pursued with both persistence and vigour, not only in the British Isles but also abroad, especially in the United States of America, where it is hoped to gain the active support of not only the House of Representatives and Senate, but also the extremely articulate Irish-American elements. Now the Northern Ireland Office have

produced a booklet whose cover has the simple title: "Armagh Prison. Strip Searching. The Facts." Thereinit is plainly stated that there is no foundation for statements or

suggestions that the search procedures at Armagh are different from those which have been "routinely used for

many years in women's prisons in Great Britain under a similar Prison Rule." "In fact the procedures are carried out in Northern Ireland in the same way," the booklet states.

Under the heading" What does strip searching amount to?" the booklet points out that the search is carried out in privacy in the reception area of the prison with just two women officers present. The prisoner enters an enclosed cubicle, the front of which is covered by a shoulder-high curtain and in a room which is always heated. The statement goes on to outline how a prisoner is strip searched is made clear that at no time does a prisoner have to stand about naked.

Human Dignity Respected - NIO

The NIO makes clear that the prisoner removes her clothing and passes each item outtoone of the women officers for searching. While the prisoner is in the curtained cubicle she can put on a prisonmade top and skirt or, if she prefers, a freshly-laundered sheet. When the clothes have been searched the curtain is drawn back and the officer observes the prisoner briefly in

the cubicle to ensure that she has not hidden anything on her person. Some women prisoners choose not to make use of either the top and skirt or the sheet, nor is the search or any part of itseen by other prisoners or members of staff other than those directly involved. The whole of the search procedure takes only a few minutes, says the booklet, and "Male officers are never present during the

searches." The publication of the booklet was announced in the House of Commons by Parliamentary Under Secretary of State, Mr. Nicholas Scott, in reply to a question by Mr. William Powell, M.P., Corby. Quoting a sentence in the booklet the Minister gave reassurance that the searches "are conducted sensitively and with due regard to considerations of human dignity." So

why the continued campaigning over strip searching? Surely in the light of the information given in the booklet and the Minister's reassurance those who make protest ought to turn their thoughts to another aspect of the matter. Such as why these women come to be in prison in the first case... Didn't Pope John have something to say about criminality at Drogheda several years ago?

During some very late Spring cleaning operations the writer came across a faded cutting from the "Irish Times" dated May 30, 1964. Here it is as it appeared that day:

"Many new jobs at Aldergrove R.A.F. station

Aldergrove R.A.F. station will become the biggest aircraft-servicing depot in the United Kingdom, according to present plans for expanding the maintenance unit there after the departure of R.A.F. personnel.

Group-Capt. W. L. Clarke, who will become commanding officer of the air station next Monday, stated at a press conference, yesterday, that 400 workers were needed in addition to the six hundred already employed there, and men with special skills such as instrument and electical fitters, radio technicians, airframe fitters and engine experts would be needed. In addition an apprentice training scheme is to be inaugurated.

Control of air traffic at Belfast Civilian Airport, which now occupies a large part of the aerodrome, is to be handed over by the R.A.F. to the Ministry of Civil Aviation, on Monday."

How many of us remember the RAF planes flying over Northern Ireland? How many remember the outcry which wentup when it was announced that Northern Ireland was no longer to be an RAF base, and the point made strongly, if unavailingly, that Northern Ireland provided several land-

ing places for Royal Air Force planes during the last war. Was it not at Lough Erne that Catalinas took off to track down the German battleship "Bismark" and led to her being sunk in an epic naval battle? It was argued officially at the time the RAF were withdrawn from

Ulster that the Battle of the Atlantic had been won and there was no further need to have Northern Ireland retained as the home of one of the RAF stations on active service. And so the first of Britain's strategic withdrawals took place . . . leaving only tablets in churches and other war memorials thoughout the Province to recall the bravery and self-sacrifice of gallant Ulstermen who took to the skies to defend our country in the face of German and Nazi tyranny. Have another read at that cutting which I reproduce. and see if you detact the nonowness of the promise of those 400 jobs.



Social Justice and Fairness

Sir, — I was delighted to get a copy of your issue for May 1985 from your supporter Mr. James Annett, Jnr. and to find that you had published my letter under the title, "Effects and Their Causes."

May I be allowed to say how much I have been cheered and encouraged by Mr. Annett's quiet understanding of letters I have been able to get into the "Irish Times" and the "Belfast News Letter" — where I have been trying to advise Everybody — not just in Ulster or Ireland or Britain or Europe but all over the world that what is really required of each of us is a readiness to allow every other person in society to adhere to their chosen beliefs and to work for them in a spirit of mutual tolerance?

I was raised as a Scottish Presbyterian both in my home and the schools of Auchtermuchty, Cupar-FIFE and Dundee, where I trained to be a school-teacher. But I did not find a state under an established religion a happy experience and when I found ministers joining the British Forces to fight the Germans who, no doubt, also had Protestant ministers praying to God for German victory I

thought to myself that there was something very wrong with the way the world was organised.

This initial impression was confirmed by the experiences I had as a teacher over a span of 38 years when I found that because I left the Church and opposed the idea of any established state church I was denied promotion from ministers and councillors on the Dundee Education Committee who all obviously believed that there was nothing wrong with teaching all children to pray (on established church lines) when it was quite obvious that many children had parents who were Roman Catholics, Moslems, Humanists, Atheists, Hindus, Jews, etc. etc. etc.

Now this refusal to allow me to become promoted to a higher post deprived me of about £550 per year income apart from other disadvantages. So, not very surprisingly perhaps, I became convinced that I must work for a fairer social system, not just in Scotland, or Britain, or Europe, or the "Western World" but in the world as a

But then I found that my letters were censored by editors who obviously thought their prime duty was to uphold the present unfair system in Britain and this suppression of

personal beliefs and views is still being widely practised I find in so-called "communications media" all over the world. It is at work within the BBC and IBA and the vast majority of British newspapers and journals and, although the Bible teaches "Swear not at all," the phoney Christians in Westminster and Whitehall all think nothing of swearing allegiance to a British system which is part of the division complex of a world run on diplomatic channels which are all very suspect

What is really needed to enable us to clear up all these very deep and very basic issues in our dangerous multi-nation worldisthatallcommunicators should copy the permissive discussion attitude of the "Orange Standard." I may not be correct in all my ideas but on this I am deeply sure and thus I thank you for your tolerant

Labour Fears Ulster's Trade Unionists

M.W. Bro. Rev. Martin Smyth, B.A., B.D., MP.P., M.P.A. has welcomed moves by trade unionists in Northern Ireland to participate more in national union affairs.

As well as strengthening democracy, he says, this will have implications for the Labour Party and Neil Kinnock.

"As trade unionists in Northern Ireland demand greater democracy in their unions, I believe that many of them will start to question the two-faced stand which the TUC and the Labour Party have taken, Bro. Smyth stated.

"Both these organisations take money in the form of affiliation fees and levies from Ulster trade unionists, and yet they ignore these people when it comes to decision-making.

"No taxation without representation applies very much at this case, especially after recent events in the TGWU. However, I do think that the Labour leadership is frightened of having trade unionists from Northern Ireland in the party. I believe this is because they know that trade union members from Northem Ireland would not allow the Labour party to be hi-jacked by the Livingstones and the Benns of this world."

He went on to encourage trade unionists in Northern Ireland to become more involved in their unions, saving that this "was a democratic right, and an effective way of counterbalancing propaganda aimed against Ulster by republican sympathisers on the mainland."
